Be a Prophet of Prayer & Sacrifice for these Isles and the Church! Trust in God's Mercy and cry out unceasingly to the Lord for his Mercy to enfold the British Isles this Divine Mercy Sunday!

Our event this year takes place in Church (not on the coast) as the Divine Mercy Feast Day requires Holy Mass alongside a programme which may include Adoration, Rosary, Meditation on the Passion, Veneration of the Image of Divine Mercy,



Chaplet of Mercy, Talk on Confession & the renewal of the Sacrament of Confession.

The Rosary will begin at 2pm and then at 3pm there will be the Chaplet of Divine Mercy followed by devotions for the Hour of Mercy. Our intention together at this moment is to invoke God's Mercy upon the whole world and especially upon our Isles. We pray for a renewal of Faith, Life and Peace. This will be an intense moment of intercession – we are pleading for the spiritual renewal of our Isles.

St. Faustina explained the importance of praying for our Nations. St. Faustina wrote in her Diary – "I often pray for Poland, but I see God is very angry with it because of its ingratitude. I exert all the strength of my soul to defend it. I constantly remind God of the promises of His mercy. When I see His anger, I throw myself trustingly into the abyss of His Mercy, and I plunge all Poland in it, and then He cannot use His justice. My country, how much you cost me! A FUTURE FULL OF HOPE - The Year of Prayer:

Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord

All of us have probably experienced rollercoaster days which can cause us to go from a state of great joy into one of despair. As we recall the events of Jesus entering Jerusalem and all that followed on from that euphoric entry, we are invited into the suffering and death of Jesus, to focus on an experience which Jesus freely participated in. This does not mean that it was easy. Suffering by its very nature is painful, whether it be emotional, psychological or physical. One week on from today we will celebrate the resurrection of Jesus but during the week ahead we remember that Jesus continues to suffer in His body, that is in the people who are suffering today, victims of abuse, of injustice, of betrayal and of persecution. As we reflect on this let us pray for these victims that, they too, will rise with the Lord.

HEALING SERVICE: will take place at St John the Evangelist, South Parade, Bath on **Friday 26 April at 7pm.** There will be Adoration, Reconciliation, Holy Mass and Healing. Father Gary from the Missionaries of the Most Holy Eucharist (who visited here recently) is the preacher.

CARDINAL: HELP YOUNG PEOPLE TO BUILD DISCIPLINE AND SELF-CONTROL IN THEIR LIVES TO COUNTER GANG CULTURE: Cardinal Vincent Nichols joined other church leaders in central London for a rally to call for an end to knife crime, to demand action and to stand alongside young people, families and communities affected by the scourge of violent crime.

The Standing Together rally against knife crime and youth violence took place in Trafalgar Square on Saturday, 6 April 2019. Speaking afterwards, Cardinal Nichols spoke about the need to provide young people with alternatives to gangs:

"The only way of counteracting a gang culture is to create for young people a sense of belonging to something else - something that's positive, creative and attractive to them.

"I had a request from a priest this week who's looking to start a boxing club in his parish. In my youth in Liverpool there were a lot of Catholic parishes with boxing clubs because they taught discipline and the right use of strength. They even produced a few world champions - John Conteh was one - but this was the alternative to gang culture and this is the kind of reaction we need to involve young people in a way that calls out their commitment and helps them to build discipline and self-control in their lives, and that's the best counter to some of the worst influences today."

The Cardinal also made reference to negative social media influences:

"In families and schools we need to be scrupulous in telling each other the truth and not hiding behind the half-truths, crudeness and unworthiness of things that are cheap, quick and popular today. Young people need deep roots so they can stand tall and grow to their full potential.

He also had a direct message to young people who have found themselves involved in gangs or carrying knives:

"If you or your friends are involved in gangs, try to find a way out. If you or your friends carry or possess knives, go to one of the banks and anonymously get rid of the knife in your possession - just get rid of it. It doesn't make you safer it puts you at risk of using it and not only will you cause harm to somebody else, you'll damage your own life.

"So build friendships, find places where you can go and sit and honestly talk and share your experiences with other people. Say your prayers - turn to God, turn to Christ and let your life grow from that relationship with Jesus rather than from anywhere else."


Continuing to talk about the need for prayer and to look to the Cross not just as a place of sorrow and suffering but a place that witnesses the birth of new hope, he said:

"For families worried about their youngsters, talk, talk, keep talking. To families who are worried and strained in their relationships, find times of silence when you sit together - say a simple prayer."

BENEDICT XVI ADDRESSES SEX ABUSE SCANDAL:

The Pope Emeritus said the sex abuse crisis cannot be understood apart from its wider social context, noting that "in the 1960s an egregious event occurred...the previously normative standards regarding sexuality collapsed entirely, and a new normalcy arose."





In an essay published Thursday at CNA, Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI offered his thoughts about the sex abuse crisis facing the Church. Benedict reviewed the sexual revolution of the 1960s, and examined its effects on priestly formation and life, before suggesting the Church's proper response.

"Today, the accusation against God is, above all, about characterizing His Church as entirely bad, and thus dissuading us from it. The idea of a better Church, created by ourselves, is in fact a proposal of the devil, with which he wants to lead us away from the living God, through a deceitful logic by which we are too easily duped," Benedict wrote in "The Church and the Scandal of sexual abuse," published April 11.

"No, even today the Church is not just made up of bad fish and weeds. The Church of God also exists today, and today it is the very instrument through which God saves us."

The emeritus pope's essay was published simultaneously in German at Klerusblatt, in Italian at Corriere della Sera, and in English at Catholic News Agency and the National Catholic Register.

The former pope said the sex abuse crisis cannot be understood apart from its wider social context, noting that "in the 1960s an egregious event occurred...the previously normative standards regarding sexuality collapsed entirely, and a new normalcy arose."

"This was in many ways a very difficult time ... the extensive collapse of the next generation of priests in those years and the very high number of laicizations were a consequence of all these developments."

Concurrently but independently, "Catholic moral theology suffered a collapse that rendered the Church defenseless against these changes in society," he wrote.

The crisis of moral theology led to an abandonment of the idea of intrinsic evil, and a rejection of the role of the Magisterium by some theologians, to which the 1993 encyclical *Veritatis Splendor* was, in part, a response.

Benedict wrote: "There are values which must never be abandoned for a greater value and even surpass the preservation of physical life," calling martyrdom "a basic category of Christian existence."

"There is a minimum set of morals which is indissolubly linked to the foundational principle of faith and which must be defended if faith is not to be reduced to a theory but rather to be recognized in its claim to concrete life," the emeritus pope reflected.

He also discussed the ecclesial reaction to paedophilia, noting that the 1983 Code of Canon Law "did not seem sufficient for taking the necessary measures," and that over time "a renewal and deepening of the deliberately loosely constructed criminal law of the new Code began to take shape."

Benedict reflected on Christ's saying that "Whoever causes one of these little ones who believe in me to sin, it would be better for him if a great millstone were hung round his neck and he were thrown into the sea."

"The phrase 'the little ones' in the language of Jesus means the common believers who can be confounded in their faith by the intellectual arrogance of those who think they are clever. So here Jesus protects the deposit of the faith with an emphatic threat of punishment to those who do it harm," he explained.

"The modern use of the sentence is not in itself wrong, but it must not obscure the original meaning," in which it is clear "that it is not only the right of the accused that is important and requires a guarantee. Great goods such as the Faith are equally important."

"A balanced canon law that corresponds to the whole of Jesus' message must therefore not only provide a guarantee for the accused, the respect for whom is a legal good. It must also protect the Faith ... A properly formed canon law must therefore contain a double guarantee – legal protection of the accused, legal protection of the good at stake. If today one puts forward this inherently clear conception, one generally falls on deaf ears when it comes to the question of the protection of the Faith as a legal good. In the general awareness of the law, the Faith no longer appears to have the rank of a good requiring protection. This is an alarming situation which must be considered and taken seriously by the pastors of the Church."

He said the decision to give competence for cases of clerical paedophilia to the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, rather than the Congregation for the Clergy "is a consequence of the importance of the Faith for the Church. In fact, it is important to see that such misconduct by clerics ultimately damages the Faith."

Benedict finally turned to what ought to be done: "Only obedience and love for our Lord Jesus Christ can point the way."

"The Lord has initiated a narrative of love with us and wants to subsume all creation in it. The counterforce against evil, which threatens us and the whole world, can ultimately only consist in our entering into this love. It is the real counterforce against evil. The power of evil arises from our refusal to love God. He who entrusts himself to the love of God is redeemed. Our being not redeemed is a consequence of our inability to love God. Learning to love God is therefore the path of human redemption."

"A paramount task, which must result from the moral upheavals of our time, is that we ourselves once again begin to live by God and unto Him. Above all, we ourselves must learn again to recognize God as the foundation of our life instead of leaving Him aside," Benedict stated.

The emeritus pope also said there must be a profound appreciation of the astoundingness of the Incarnation, and, through it, Christ's presence in the Eucharist.

"The Second Vatican Council was rightly focused on returning this sacrament of the Presence of the Body and Blood of Christ ... to the center of Christian life and the very existence of the Church. In part, this really has come about, and we should be most grateful to the Lord for it."

But "a rather different attitude is prevalent," he said. "What predominates is not a new reverence for the presence of Christ's death and resurrection, but a way of dealing with Him that destroys the greatness of the Mystery," citing declining participation in Sunday Mass and treatment of the Eucharist as "a mere ceremonial gesture."

"We do not need another Church of our own design. Rather, what is required first and foremost is the renewal of the Faith in the Reality of Jesus Christ given to us in the Blessed Sacrament."

While "there is sin in the Church and evil ... even today there is the Holy Church, which is indestructible. Today there are many people who humbly believe, suffer and love, in whom the real God, the loving God, shows Himself to us."

"In the trial against the devil, Jesus Christ is the first and actual witness for God, the first martyr, who has since been followed by countless others."

Witnesses can be found today "who stand up for God with their life and suffering. It is an inertia of the heart that leads us to not wish to recognize them. One of the great and essential tasks of our evangelization is, as far as we can, to establish habitats of Faith and, above all, to find and recognize them," Benedict concluded.

When he resigned from his office, Pope Benedict declared that he would live a life of solitude and make no interventions in order not to impede the work of the next Pope. However, Pope Francis has generously offered possibilities for Pope Benedict to make occasional entrances onto the stage of the Church. It is an indication of the gravity of this scandal that Pope Benedict has spoken out (with the approval of Pope Francis), and we should heed his call to prayer in this time of great crisis.
